Moderator's Report ~ 2022

Dear members and friends of Haslett Community Church,

2022 proved to be a year of recovery. Our church community's life continued on with cautious optimism and true grit as we are all still shaking off the past 3 years. David Arnosti and I shared the Moderator position in 2022; David served January – July, and I stepped in from August to December and then into my first full year, 2023. The goal for this position is to return to a January – December role as we go forward.

Our food pantry (<u>Mission Outreach</u>) provided aid and comfort through food, household goods, and personal care items to our greater community this year. We also had a tremendously successful Christmas Giving Project. These two outreach programs are incedibly impactful to our Haslett community as well as very important to our HCC family.

The <u>Property Committee</u> spearheaded ongoing repairs and much needed improvements to the sanctuary and grounds, as well as crucial repairs to the parsonage. The maintenance of our church is a large portion of the HCC annual budget. Over the next 3 years, additional moneys need to be allocated to these line items in order to not find ourselves in an emergency state of repair, as we have experienced in the past 2 years.

The <u>Finance Committee</u> partnered with the Stewardship Team to create a very unique and powerful presentation to educate and inform the HCC family how "Funding the Church WE LOVE" impacts the bottom line of the church's budget. A team of four people worked over 5 months on the concept, verbiage, communication, presentation, and finally the ASK to ultimately bridge the budget gap from 2021(a \$36,000 deficit) to 2022 (just over \$7500 deficit), with a strategy to overcome the deficit completely by 2023 year end.

HCC has a wide variety of committeess, work groups, volunteers, friends, and beyond, that are the arms, legs, and heart of the work that happens in order to fulfill our mission and committment to our community every day. A list of the formal committees is as follows:

Childerns Ministry, Church Growth, Finance (with Stewardship), Member Caring, Mission Outreach, Property, Social, Spiritual Life, & Youth Minstry. They all function with dedicated leaders and passionate volunteers. Information about each one, details about what they do and how you can help are available on the website or reach out to myself, Betsy or Erin, and we can direct you.

Pastor Betsy Aho and Pastor Erin Heisler wear many hats as our remarkable leadership team. From video editors, pastoral counselors, youth and adult support/sounding boards, event coordinators, idea generators, 'chief enthusiasm directors,' and, this year more than ever, finance managers. My gratitude goes out to both of these amazing women and their undying love for HCC and all the pieces that make it 'The Church We LOVE"!

2022 Accomplishments

Overview: In our first full year back in person we made considerable efforts to make as many personal contacts as possible and recreate the WELCOMING feeling that is the nature of HCC. The following program is in place and as a new committee is identified, these elements will become more regular.

Visitor and New Member Recognition Program:

- **Visitors** are identified at the door upon entrance and welcomed by greeters.
- Greeters introduce visitors to other congregation members and invite them to sit where they would like.
- Pastor Betsy welcomes all visitors and encourages them to take a 'Purple Dove Cup' from the table in Friendship Hall. This visitor cup has the most recent newsletter and DOVE doctes
- If they leave their contact information in the offertory plate, Pastor Betsy will reach out within the next week and invite them back as well as have a more in-depth conversation.
- New Members will be recognized during a regular service after they have gone through the normal channels to become an official member. A tour of the building will also occur during this process. After this ceremony, they will be presented with a 'Purple HCC Fleece Throw' as a Thank You and official WARM WELCOME (a personal Thank you note, signed by council members, will accompany the blanket).
- The new members will be assigned to a committee member to mentor them through the next 90 days. This will include answering questions, greeting them at church, introducing them to others, helping them and family get acclimated to the programs and engagement opportures
- Establish records of both Visitors and New Members to understand the conversion ratio and how to best feed the funnel of visitors.



2022 Green Team Report

In the spring of 2022 the HCC Green Team joined with other Lansing area green teams and concerned groups to assist in funding a 13 kW solar panel installation for the Southside Community Coalition Community Center on Holmes Road in Lansing. Many of our members attended the dedication ceremony on April 23, 2022.

The Green Team worked with the Property Committee this year to transplant a memorial tree for Dave Fry, which was located near the south door of the church. At the previous location, the tree was interfering with the church sewer lines. The relocated site, at a prominent location on our front lawn, will allow the tree to thrive and be more visible.

Many thanks to Doug Holem who spearheaded a grant application to Meridian Township. The grant provides funding for the removal of old juniper bushes along the sidewalk by Haslett Road. Soil and mulch have been placed, and around 150 pollinator flowers have been planted. In addition, the Michigan Historical Marker about Haslett and Pine Lake has been refurbished, and attractive benches have been placed – one by Haslett Road and one at the north church entrance.

In May some of our members joined with the Edgewood UCC green team at the Tihart Preserve Natural Area to plant trees and bushes.

The prairie garden at the south church entrance has been planted. As these plants become established, we look forward to seeing them bloom in 2023.

Thanks to Sally Garrod, landscaping has been planted along the south side of the sanctuary.

We are pleased to have Addy Stuever, a UCC Climate Justice fellow, work with the green teams of both HCC and Edgewood UCC. Addy will be helping us out on various projects. In October she hosted a presentation via Zoom on agriculture and the environment.

We have reached out to environmental groups at both Haslett and Okemos High Schools and hope to work together for common goals. Addy will be helping us work with them.

In conjunction with the Mid-Michigan chapter of Interfaith Power and Light, we continue to work with other houses of worship in the area to develop and strengthen their green teams.

We plan to seek ways to work toward making Haslett Community Church carbon neutral in 2023 and beyond.

Member Caring Committee Report 2022

The Member Caring Committee is a long-standing committee within the church.
The committee holds meetings 4 times a year or approximately once each quarter.

Current Members: Carol Cramer, Kelly Flagg (Chairperson), Betty Robinson, Barbara Szkotnicki, and Nancy White.

Friends of Member Caring: (those willing to help with memorials by providing food/flowers/set up... yet not come to quarterly meetings). In September, our church held a "Love your Church" event in an effort to share committee work with church members, hoping to increase volunteers. It worked so well we redesigned our committee to include three levels: The Main Committee, Friends of Member Caring and Additional Friends of Member Caring. All will volunteer their service or provide food when needed. Lists of both are attached including contact information.

Council Member representing the Member Caring Committee: Nancy White

Duties of the Member Caring Committee

The MCC coordinates receptions for funeral services, memorial services, and remembrance services. The committee also coordinates receptions at the church such as Ecclesiastical Councils, Ordinations, and the Michigan Conference of the UCC special meetings.

The committee provides assistance to members of the congregation during times of illness or injury by coordinating meals. Occasionally we also provide assistance to a member in need following surgery.

The committee members volunteer to serve as coordinators or on coordination teams for funerals on a monthly basis. This list is given to the pastor and the office manager. Other services provided such as meals and/or occasional help are covered by individual members on a case-by-case basis.

While members of the Main and Friends of Member Caring committee do the planning and much of the legwork for funerals and events, many volunteers from the Additional Friends of Member Caring assist us. The coordinators arrange for food, recruit workers, and manage the reception. Food is both purchased and requested from volunteers. These receptions can vary in size from 50 to 150 people depending on the type and preferences of the family.

For meals and occasional help coordinators also sign up on a monthly basis. When meals are requested, an email is sent to the team and volunteers prepare food.

Loaves and Fishes: Monthly our church provides a meal for the Loaves and Fishes in downtown Lansing. We provide a main dish, vegetable, salad, and dessert. Nancy White coordinates the sign up, and Paula Fry transports the meal.

In 2022 we provided funeral/memorials for 1 person, Brandan O'Brien. While not a member of our church presently, Brandan was married in the church many years ago. His memorial was held August 17th.

This event sparked a conversation with Pastor Betsy and the MCC committee about providing memorial services to the community at large. We are a "Community" Church and would always want to be open to helping others. At this time, we updated our Memorial Service outline including suggested costs for services and guidelines for the use of the church.

A New Minister Induction and Reception was held at the Church on September 25th for Jenn Tafel. The member caring committee provided cake, cheese and crackers, and punch for the event.

October 23rd our **new UCC Conference Minister**, Lillian Daniel, was inducted at Edgewood United Church. Member Caring provided veggie and cookie trays for the event.

Meals were provided for Larry Leefers and Karen Klein

Updated Records: In October/November a group of members met to update, retype, and assemble new Member Caring notebooks. Extra copies are stored at the church. NOTE: These notebooks contain information and recipes for coordination and organization of memorials.

Special Thanks to Nancy White for a cost analysis breakdown for receptions and to Carol Cramer who retyped the edited pages.

At the end of each meeting, we continue a tradition of ending with the reciting of the Old Irish Blessing. Therefore, it is an appropriate ending to this report.

From his fullness we have all received, grace upon grace-John 1:16. Our committee deeply appreciates the gifts of encouragement, money, food, and labor given all year by many church and community members. This generosity has made it possible to extend the grace of our material abundance.

<u>Food Pantry</u>: Team leaders - Ruth Linnemann, Carl Wegener, Jim Durr

- Recipients are residents of Haslett School District and receive a one-week supply of groceries per visit.
- The Haslett Food Pantry was given the name the Mary L. Nelson Food Pantry.
- 515 visits were completed with recipients from 188 households; all service continued as curb side pick-up per COVID protocol.
- Fifty volunteers are involved in food pantry operations, two-thirds of them volunteer a minimum of four hours monthly.
- Our extra food and bakery goods when available were provided to Cristo Rey, Grange Acres, and the First Presbyterian-Lansing Food Pantry.
- A volunteer recycles moldy bread at Hammond Farms for composting. Cost is \$2 per 5-gallon pail.

Food Pantry Community Donations (cash, food)

 HCC members; Haslett Middle and High School; Ralya and Murphy Elementaries; St. Martha's Catholic Church; Okemos Nursery School; Sons of the American Legion; Tom's Grocery customers; Ingham County Home Assn; Mayfair Bar; Haslett Kiwanis; Kroger (bakery & meat); Panera Bread-Okemos, and many community individuals and small group drop-offs.

Weekend Support Kits (WSK): Team leaders - Jim Durr with co-leaders Judy Teegreeny, Gail Hicks

- Weekend food kits are supplied twice monthly to students in need, elementary through high school to provide weekend meals for children.
- A total of 776 kits were delivered to Haslett School district students.

<u>Lansing CROP Hunger Walk-Sunday, October 9</u>: Coordinator – Kirk Riley

- Haslett Community Church CROP participants chose to continue using a local route instead of the central Lansing route. We had a beautiful day walking around/or half around Lake Lansing with a lovely water/rest stop at Ron and Cathy Rowe's home.
- 32 adult and youth walkers raised over \$9,000. Thanks to all who participated by walking or donating or both.

<u>Christmas Giving Project</u>: Team leaders - Ruth Linnemann, Jim Durr, Kelly Flagg, Wendy Johnson, Barb Szkotnicki, Rich Baumgartner

- 83 families with 214 children received a holiday meal, groceries, gifts, Meijer food cards, and age-specific "stockings."
- Donations of gifts, cash, and volunteer assistance makes the project possible. Dozens of volunteers are involved as family interviewers, youth group shoppers, grocery packers, and crews for stocking assembly, distribution, kitchen, and cleanup.
- About 60% of the gifts were provided by HCC members and 40% by the Haslett area school students and personnel and community organization & individuals.

Red Cross Blood Drives:

- Hosted by HCC the third Friday of odd-numbered months; several volunteers distribute posters.
- Rich Baumgartner, Ann Pierce, and Dave Vietti set up for blood drives, and the Men's Group cleans up and resets Sanctuary.

Other Mission Efforts

- One Great Hour of Sharing congregational offering collected \$2,730 in 2022.
- Kroger Community Rewards awarded the Food Pantry \$447.06 in 2022.
- Meijer Simply Give provided the Haslett Food Pantry \$30,930 food purchasing cards within 2022.

2023 GOALS

- 1) Continue the audit of identifying each area in/around the church grounds that are currently utilized for storage, identify future needs of the church community, and create a structure that promotes a maintenance plan and fosters new ideas to gain efficiencies.
- 2) Complete the electrical and/or HVAC reviews and potential upgrades for safety and efficiencies for the church and parsonage upstairs bathroom.
- 3) Create a new structure for the Property Committee that allows for Vice Chairs of each managed area, i.e., parsonage, grounds, technology, safety, church building. This will allow for the responsibilities of the building to be shared.
- 4) Project "real" costs for maintenance of HCC properties; encouraging gifts to be documented for future cost consideration (we have done great improvements in this area in 2022). This will also include a new process for annual quotes to ensure competitive prices for all services and goods.
- 5) Continue our pursuit for future plans to build an ADA-compliant, safe playground via grants.

- 7) reorganization of janitorial closet
- 8) partial relocation of food bank box storage
- 9) new, donated parsonage furnace and air conditioning
- 10) north and west sides of church building scaped, repaired, and painted
- 11) updates via a grant to Haslett Road garden area
- 12) pest control
- 13) revisited the electrical audit conducted in preparation of needed upgrades in 2023
- 14) installed new kitchen screen door
- 15) identified trees that need removal; one tree was removed from the south stairway area
- 16) sold some unused items, cleaned out closets and recycled unwanted items
- 17) relocated all church records to dedicated space in the property closet

The above pandemic-era efforts were truly a team sport; I am grateful for the work of our community coming together to tackle some not-so-fun projects.

In addition, Safety Team completed the following in 2022:

- 1) Purchased, installed, and painted two more secure double doors for the Sunday School hallway and a door for the exit from the youth room. Added a bolt for security.
- 2) A warning bell system was installed between the upstairs and downstairs for use during Sunday School and Youth Groups.
- 3) Safety sleeves were purchased and installed for certain types of doors.

Various safety trainings for members are in the planning stages for 2023.

The property committee thanks all the staff, committees, and special groups at HCC that assist us in maintaining our structures, inside and out. Special thanks to our members and donors for their generosity during the last year; we simply could not have completed needed repairs without your support! We are grateful.

As we move forward into 2023, our team will continue to reach out to members of other HCC committees & groups that have a direct link to the inside and outside of our buildings to discuss and provide a process to request new ideas, fixes, additions, etc. We continue to strive to find ways to keep/make HCC safe, welcoming, beautiful, clean, well-maintained, eco-friendly areas while striving to keep the properties as maintenance free as possible.

Sanctuary Team

The Sanctuary Team's mission is to integrate computer technology into all aspects of the church, but especially the Sunday morning services and other services held in the sanctuary (weddings, funerals, special music, etc.). As a team, we want to enhance the church service for those present in the sanctuary and enable streaming for those who attend remotely. And we want to make sure that the technology works so that every service looks and sounds good—the cameras, sound system, lighting, and streaming of the service via YouTube. We operate on the principle that if no one notices what we do, we probably did everything just right.

Members of the Sanctuary Committee include Pastor Betsy, Barbara Freeman, Becky Leefers, Bill Copland, David Jones, Helen Jones, Jim Gornick, Kirk Riley, and Rich Newport. And our dedicated team of sound techs: Helen Jones, David Jones, Jon Lineberry, Rich Newport, Kirk Riley, Jim Gornick, and Ambrose Meteyer.

We have made big strides with the technology over the past couple of years. As the team leader, I want to recognize Rich Newport for the many hours he's worked to get the technology just right, even writing custom computer code; and Pastor Betsy, for enthusiastically using technology to stream services and providing a "script" (which camera? which microphone?) to the techs every Sunday to make our job easier. HCC services are streamed via YouTube and generally have between 40 and 100 views—a significant addition to those who attend in person. In addition to in-person and streaming, we also offer radio streaming to cars parked right by the church; tune to 88.7 FM.

Some of the more important technology developments over the past year:

- New microphones for the choir area, enhancing the sound of the choir both in the sanctuary and over the stream.
- Stream Deck, which gives us added control of the movement of the camera during the service. It acts just like the camera remote control
- Added the FM transmitter, enabling congregants to listen from their cars.
- We added a ceiling microphone to the sanctuary which allows viewers/listeners to hear the congregation speaking during responsive portions of the services. It also allows the organ to be heard better during the service.
- Integrating remote music, video, and readings into the in-person and streamed service.

You are welcome to join us! We have training available on working the sound system, and you would be paired with experienced techs. To volunteer as a sound tech or member of the Sanctuary Team, please contact Kirk Riley at rileyki@msu.edu or by phone at 517-881-0702.








On Easter, our kids (with help from the congregation) surprised Pastor Betsy with a special Easter basket in celebration of her first "normal" Easter with us!




We ended 2022 with our Family Christmas Service in December. It was a wonderful service filled with the musical gifts of many of our children!

Pastors Report, Annual Report January-December 2022 Rev. Betsy Aho

Haslett Community Church, United Church of Christ, is healthy and thriving in so many ways. For that, I am grateful. We also have some challenges to face together, and we have, and we will. And God is in all of it.

Here are some of the highlights, challenges, and transitions that shaped HCC in 2022.

Challenges:

- We began the year with a temporary pause of in-person worship, for the month of January, when the Omicron Variant of COVID-19 was flaring. After being in-person since the fall of 2021, this was a hard decision. But we were back in February!
- Financial concerns were woven into this year. The budget that was passed for 2022 had a significant deficit, and we ended the year with an even larger deficit of nearly \$50,000 from where we started. Spending was slowed, even for the Food Pantry, as we tried to stem the flow of money out. That inspired our giving campaign of Fully Funding the Church that We Love.
- We did not receive a \$5,000 Vitality Grant through the Michigan Conference that would have helped us jump start the accessible and adaptable playground project I have dreamed about.

Highlights:

- The year began with a remarkably Holy and beneficial leadership retreat in January called "From Silos to Starlings." The whole retreat happened via Zoom, which was met with skepticism, but those who attended agreed it was time well spent.
- We partnered with Edgewood United Church for a Lent study on Water Justice called, "Thirsting," including a pulpit swap with Rev. Liz Miller and myself.
- The congregation and I enjoyed our first in person Holy Week and Easter together since I came to Haslett Community Church! I enjoyed every moment of it! COVID took so much from us, but nothing is taken for granted now that we are together. Erin Heisler organized a surprise for me plastic eggs filled with affirmations from the congregation!
- Over the summer, we held our 2nd season of the HCC Summer Concert Series which was a success! We hope to continue, perhaps with more family-friendly events.
- In July, the Rev. Dr. Lillian Daniels began serving as the Michigan Conference Minister of the United Church of Christ! I was so proud to serve on the Search Committee that brought her here. HCC welcomed Dr. Daniels to the pulpit in October, and she made a positive and lasting impression.
- HCC and Edgewood United Church were awarded a grant for a Climate Justice Fellow for the 2022-2023 academic year. Addy Stuever, a senior at Michigan State University, was selected to be our Fellow and has been working with both congregations since September. She will continue her work into the spring, and we are thrilled to have her.
- Our fall was shaped by the theme "The Church You Love." We began in September with a kick-off event called, "Welcome Home to the Church You Love" to reignited knowledge of and interest in Committees, Teams, and involvement in the church.

- As a congregation, we produced an art installation that hung over the fireplace, in which folks used drawings and phrases to finish the sentence, "The Church You Love, Loves..."
- I taught an Introduction to Hebrew Class for the midweek program, and it was the largest class yet. It culminated in a field trip to a Friday Shabbat service at Congregation Shaarey Zedek in East Lansing with instruction from Rabbi Bigman prior to the service.
- As part of my work on the Committee on Ministry for the Covenant Association, I was invited to attend the remote option for the "Authorizing Ministry for the 21st Century" conference offered by the National Setting of the UCC. It was helpful, challenging, and inspiring.
- The two in-person Christmas Eve Services were lively and well attended, and a wonderful way to
 end the year! The blizzard on Christmas Eve was a good reminder of the importance of offering a
 livestream as well.

Transitions:

- After nearly 55 years of dedicated service to and love for the Haslett Community Church Choir, Judy Connelly retired as Choir Director in August. She still attends worship and guest-directs on occasion.
 We plan to have a big service and party in her honor in 2023. Judy is part of the soul of HCC, a treasure!
- After guiding the church through the Pastor Search, followed quickly by a long season of guiding the church through a global pandemic, David Arnosti transitioned out of the role of Church Moderator on August 1, and we welcomed Malinda Barr to the role. We are grateful for David's faithful service throughout the transition, and we are moving forward with Malinda at the helm.

Reflecting on 2022, I recognize there are many more highlights than challenges. I continue to have some concerns about the financial stability of the church, but recognize the strides our Fully Funding the Church You Love campaign made this fall, that will continue into the new year. The Finance Committee of Kyle Carnes (Chair), Kirk Riley (Stewardship), Malinda Barr, myself, with a lot of work and input from Bob Heisler (Treasurer) is solid, creative, realistic, and inspiring. I am grateful. And, as I shared with the congregation earlier this year, I do think financial challenges are easier to overcome than many other challenges a church can face.

As I move forward in 2023, I personally plan to continue my own spiritual growth and self-care through monthly visits with my Spiritual Director, monthly meetings with my Clergywomen Writing Group, and connections with my colleagues.

I give thanks that HCC is becoming known in the community as a place of welcome for all ages, family structures, and more, a place of healthy theology and thoughtful worship, community programs, and invitation and accessibility through our many options for worship and programming. Erin Heisler is also a gift to this community, this church, and to me. I am grateful for the highlights of the year, and the faithful staff, lay-leaders, and volunteers that keep Haslett Community Church, UCC moving ahead. And through the challenges and transitions, God is good.
