That doesn't mean that this newsletter is devoid of any information about future events (embracing the moment does not actually stop time, after all!) but, I hope to cultivate a practice of presence with you, with God, and with my friends and family over the next few weeks. Who knows, maybe it will even carry over into fall ... and maybe not ... but I won't worry about that in *this* moment.

Ageing On Our Own Terms

Earlier this year, Pastor Betsy asked us to help put together an opportunity for members of our church family who, like us, are either nearing or are in our retirement years, or who may have parents or family members who are reaching their "golden years."

The intent of this series is to provide an opportunity for interested members of our church family to:

- (1) learn about the physical and mental changes related to ageing,
- (2) how to maintain desired activities and interests, including *Independence*, *Privacy*, and *Empowerment* in decision making, including medical and end of life situations, and
- (3) to possibly develop an ongoing common interest/mutual support group within our church family.

We have covered various issues related to ageing as follows:

Part One - Physical and mental changes (June newsletter)

Part Two - Legal challenges of ageing (July newsletter)

Part Three - Residential challenges and choices (August newsletter)

Part Four - Facilitated group discussion including personal experiences and questions (September/October) - This will include at least two opportunities for anyone interested in discussing these topics to get together for an hour or so as a group.

Ageing On Our Own Terms - Residential Issues

This is the last of three articles in the **Ageing On Our Own Terms** series. Our hope is that the information serves as food for thought and that those thoughts will be shared during the facilitated discussions that will take place on Thursday, September 29, at 7:00 pm and on Sunday, October 2, at 11:30 am. We hope you will join us for one of these discussions!

Residence changes and options

Historically, care for the elderly or infirm was accomplished within the extended family unit. Hospitals were a last resort, and nursing homes did not exist. If there was no other recourse, the elderly and infirm were put in poor houses or asylums.

But beginning in the mid-twentieth century, as massive improvements in medicine came along (antibiotics, vaccines, blood pressure medications, advanced surgical techniques, chemotherapy, kidney/heart/lung/liver transplants, to name just a few), hospitals became places of hope and cure, rather than of sickness and despondency. Communities could not build hospitals fast enough. With massive government funding starting in the 1950s, over 9,000 community medical centers were built in the next two decades. Nursing homes were built by hospitals to house those patients who needed to recover and/or rehab. Nursing home growth was accelerated by new funding when Medicare was passed in 1965.

The problem with this medical model for the care of the sick and the old is not that medical providers have had an incorrect view of what makes life significant. The problem is that they have had almost no view at all. Medicine's focus is narrow. Medical professionals concentrate on repair of health, not sustenance of the soul.

In 1991, Dr. Bill Thomas, MD became the staff doctor at a nursing home in upstate New York soon after graduating from Harvard Medical School. He coined the phrase "the Three Plagues" of nursing home existence: boredom, loneliness, and helplessness. He set out to address those conditions at his nursing home. He secured a grant from the state along with waivers for a number of regulations, and brought in (continued on pg. 10...)

plants and parakeets for every room, along with dogs and cats for every floor. The lawn was converted to a vegetable and flower garden, along with other, similar changes.

In a subsequent study comparing his facility with a traditional facility, it was found that the number of prescriptions required per resident fell to half that of the control nursing home. Psychotropic drugs for agitation, like Haldol, decreased in particular. The total drug costs fell to 38 percent of the comparison facility. Deaths fell by 15 percent. Dr. Thomas believed that the difference in death rates can be traced to the fundamental need for a reason to live. He says, "You should not need to sacrifice your autonomy just because you need help with your life." Dr. Thomas has gone on to found several nationally acclaimed alternative elder care programs and is an internationally recognized expert.

We typically define "autonomy" in our lives as living completely independently, free of coercion and limitation.

Philosopher Ronald Dworkin said that there is a second, more compelling sense of autonomy.

"Whatever the limits and travails we face, we want to retain the autonomy -the freedom- to be the authors of our lives. The value of autonomy...lies in the scheme of responsibility it creates: autonomy makes each of us responsible for shaping his own life according to some coherent and distinctive sense of character, conviction, and interest. It allows us to lead our own lives rather than to be led along them, so that each of us can be, to the extent such a scheme of rights can make this possible, what he had made himself."

Thankfully, there are now more options that allow us to maintain our autonomy in response to physical and mental changes. The options range from ageing in place at home to full time care in a nursing home.

Ageing in place:

What is it? When an older adult lives in their own home or with family.

Who is it good for? An older adult who is still relatively independent or can get the level of care or help they need.

How it works. Simple home repairs or modifications to make the home safer, such as installing bathroom grab bars, a medical alert system, or installing a wheelchair ramp. The use of in-home caregivers to provide assistance with activities of daily living along with the use of meal delivery services, like Meals on Wheels and a house cleaning service.

Relative cost? Low to medium but can require more help from family and friends.

Independent Living

What is it? Any housing designed exclusively for seniors, usually including retirement communities, retirement homes, senior housing, and senior apartments.

Who is it good for? Older adults who want to live in an active community setting, without having to be concerned with daily chores like house maintenance, cooking, or housekeeping.

How it works. Somewhat like a campus-style setting where people of similar age live together in a community that provides opportunities for socialization. In general, the housing is more compact, easier to navigate, and includes help with outdoor maintenance.

Relative cost? Medium to high. Depending on the location and services, costs can range from \$1,500 to \$10,000 per month.

Residential care

What is it? Small facilities that offer personalized service to small groups of adults. They are also known as adult family homes, board and care homes, or personal care homes.

Who is it good for? Someone who needs more individual, home-setting care.

How it works. They provide lodging, meal services, and assistance with activities of daily living.

Relative cost? Medium. They can often be half the cost of nursing homes and, in some states, are more affordable than assisted living care.

Continuing Care Retirement Community

What is it? These communities are part independent living, part assisted living, and part skilled nursing facility.

Who is it good for? Older adults who want to live in one location for the rest of their life and don't want to worry about arranging for future care needs. They are also good for spouses who want to stay close to one another even if one requires a higher level of care.

How it works. Residents can start out living in the independent living section and move to different parts of the same community as they need increasing levels of care.

Relative cost? High. CCRSs are the most expensive of all long-term-care options. There is a significant entrance fee as well as monthly fees that increase as higher levels of care are needed.

Nursing home/skilled nursing facility

What is it? This option is for older adults who need 24-hour supervised care with meals, activities, and health management.

Who is it good for? Older adults with severe or debilitating physical or mental illnesses who are unable to care for themselves.

How it works. A licensed physician supervises each resident's care, and a nurse or other medical professional is almost always on premises. Some facilities have physical and occupational therapists on staff. Others have special services for Alzheimer's or dementia memory care.

Relative cost? High. Costs vary according to the level of daily help requires and the type of living space.

Some of us have had experience with one or more of these options with a parent, spouse, or sibling. Some of us have not.

There are no easy answers to the challenges of ageing. The best we can do is educate ourselves as to the changes we can expect in ourselves and our loved ones, and constantly plan for how we will manage our physical and psychological changes as we age so that we can live our best lives on our own terms as much as possible. As we move to the discussion parts of this series, we hope we will be able, as a church family, to help each of us find resources to help on our life journeys.
