# Philanthropy Matters - Mid-Year Insights from the Finance Chair

Ah, summer is here! And church is less of a staple in many of our schedules as we go to the lake, the cabin, or the campground. And we should enjoy summer, because it is short and glorious in Michigan! However, Church persists nonetheless! Isn't it nice to have a spiritual community all year long when we aren't out and about?

This is first of all a thank you note for those of you who have committed to pledging your offering to the church and have been so faithful over these past few years in particular! During the pandemic our pledged giving has never dipped or wavered! We have consistently remained ahead of schedule with pledges coming in month to month!

Since we have been meeting back in person, loose plate offerings are back up again to our projected levels! The one area that is still lagging behind is identified non-pledged giving.

We are currently looking at a deficit of \$31,000. That means we have already had \$31,000 more in expenses than income thus far this year. The congregation did approve a deficit budget, so we knew we'd be dipping into our cash reserves to pay this year's bills, but we'd love that deficit to be as small as possible! We hope to still make up this difference by the end of the year with a new and renewed focus on fully funding the cost of the church we love!

Currently the only line item that is right on course for this time of year is personnel. This means we are keeping our obligations to our staff, which is exactly where we want to be! The only line item overspent at this time is building repair and maintenance as we continue to make sure our building is safe and up to date. Every other line item is currently below budget!

Whether you pledge or give without pledging, or you're just venturing into HCC and your offering is loose in the passed plate, we encourage everyone to consider this summer what it means to have a church community to call home. We remember that all of our financial contributions are essential. Whether you give \$5 a month or \$500, what matters is that each of us contributes faithfully and regularly to the life, ministry, and mission of our congregational community! And even though there are dozens of ways to think about how to give, I encourage everyone to at least take a moment to consider their weekly offering. Consider how much you spend each week on groceries, gasoline, being caffeinated, and general leisure. How does this compare to your weekly church offering?

Take a few minutes this summer to consider again your role in fully funding the life, mission, and ministry of this church that you love. And maybe you can breathe easily knowing you are already doing what you can. Or perhaps the Spirit is moving in a new way. Give out of gratitude and it will always be enough!

For now, we are looking for folks who would be interested in serving in the nursery for a week at a time this summer. The sign up is available <u>HERE!</u>



# Ageing On Our Own Terms

Earlier this year, Pastor Betsy asked us to help put together an opportunity for members of our church family who, like us, are either nearing or are in our retirement years, or who may have parents or family members who are reaching their "golden years."

The plan for this series is to provide an opportunity for interested members of our church family to:

- (1) learn about the physical and mental changes related to ageing,
- (2) how to maintain desired activities and interests, including *Independence*, *Privacy*, and *Empowerment* in decision making, including medical and end of life situations, and
- (3) to possibly develop an ongoing common interest/mutual support group within our church family.

The series will address three topics over the course of four months, with three newsletter articles, one per month, on one of the topics. The fourth month will offer a facilitated discussion group, probably on two different dates and times.

# Part One - Physical and mental changes (June newsletter)

This includes an overview of normal changes that affect just about everyone, such as deteriorating vision or hearing, cognitive health changes, etc., as well as common individually specific conditions such as Alzheimer's, Parkinson's, osteoporosis, diabetes, mental health/depression, malnutrition, physical disabilities, etc.

### Part Two - Legal challenges of ageing (July newsletter)

This includes an overview of difficulties seniors face in managing their own health care, and options to help manage these challenges, such as a durable medical power of attorney, an advance care directive, and controlling end of life decisions.

### Part Three - Residential challenges and choices (August newsletter)

This includes an overview of the difficulties of staying in one's home as we age. It will look at "ageing in place" and ways to facilitate staying in one's home, including home modifications and in-home assistance. It will review options when "ageing in place" is not reasonable, such as, independent and assisted living facilities, group homes, nursing homes, etc.

# Part Four - Facilitated group discussion including personal experiences and questions (September)

This will include at least two opportunities for anyone interested in discussing these topics to get together for an hour or so as a group. We expect to have at least one discussion following a September worship service, and one discussion on a weekday evening.

This is the first of three topics which will be part of the **Ageing Our Own Terms** series. The hope is that the information serves as food for thought and that those thoughts will be shared during the facilitated discussion that will take place in September.



# Part Two: Legal Challenges of Ageing

### Legal Challenges of Ageing

We would all like to think we are going to live forever. But as Jesus taught in Matthew 24:36, "But about that day or hour no one knows, not even the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Fa-ther."

The time to think about the end of life, whether yours or those of your loved ones, is now, while you are mentally and physically able to thoughtfully consider your preferences, and not after you have just been slammed by a devastating diagnosis or incurred a catastrophic injury. Now is also time to think about who would be best to see that our wishes and preferences are honored when we cannot do so for ourselves. Once we have made these decisions, it is time to express them in the form of an advanced medical directive and a durable medical power of attorney, designating a trusted person to make treatment decisions for us if we are not able to do so for ourselves.

When we do not know how much time we have, our natural expectation is that we have much more time than we often actually do. When we receive a difficult diagnosis, our impulse is to fight, to pursue any and all treatment offered. The fact that it may be shortening or worsening the time we have left does not seem to register. We imagine that we can wait until the doctors tell us that there is nothing more they can do. But there rarely is nothing more that doctors can do. They can offer experimental, sometimes toxic, drugs of unknown efficacy, operate to try and remove part of an "inoperable" tumor, put in a feeding tube if a person can't eat, or provide palliative drugs that relieve our pain but leave us mentally addled. Or they can bounce us to yet another specialist.

We want choices, but don't necessarily want to make the choices ourselves. So we make no choice at all and fall back on the default of asking the doctor to do something, to fix something. Terminal cancer patients who opt for these treatments aren't thinking about a few added months. They typically are thinking years. But if their doctor is honest with them, the doctor will admit that the likely outcome is weeks or maybe a few months, and may make the quality of the patient's remaining life worse than doing nothing at all.

One's end of life preferences can be expressed by answering four questions.

- 1) Do you want to be resuscitated if your heart stops?
- 2) Do you want aggressive treatments such as intubation and mechanical ventilation?
- 3) Do you want antibiotics?
- 4) Do you want tube or intravenous feeding if you cannot eat on your own?

Studies have shown that persons who have discussed these questions while still in good health with their loved ones are more likely to have advanced care directives, and to receive the care they desire. A community-wide program started in 1991 in La Crosse, Wisconsin, encouraged people to discuss these questions and develop advanced directives. Medicare statistics found that, over time, people in La Crosse spent half as many days in the hospital in the last six months of their lives as the national average, and their life expectancies increased by a full year over the national mean, despite average rates of obesity and smoking.

If we have answered these "end of life preference questions" honestly and with due consideration, we are much better prepared to deal with our natural impulses from a position of strength and control. We can better direct our own medical care in partnership with our medical providers, rather than surrendering control of our treatment.

End of life situations frequently include a palliative care specialist and Hospice care. There are five questions that the care provider should discuss with the patient, and have an agreement on the answers before care decisions have to be made: *(continued on page 11...)* 

- 1) What do you understand your prognosis to be?
- 2) What are your concerns about what lies ahead?
- 3) What kind of trade-offs are you willing to make?
- 4) How do you want to spend your time if your health worsens?
- 5) Who do you want to make decisions if you can't?

Some of us may have already answered the "end of life preference questions" for ourselves. Some of us may already have an advanced treatment directive. Some of us may have already experienced Hospice care for a parent or sibling. Some of us have not.

There are no easy answers to the challenges of ageing. The best we can do is educate ourselves as to the changes we can expect in ourselves and our loved ones, and constantly plan for how we will manage our physical and psychological changes as we age so that we can live our best lives on our own terms as much as possible. As we progress through the next few parts of this series, we hope we will be able, as a church family, to help each of us find resources to help on our life journeys.

#### The Elephant In the Room

On Friday, June 24, 2022, The Supreme Court, in a 5-4 decision, overturned Roe v. Wade, the landmark ruling that established the constitutional right to abortion in the U.S. in 1973. As is expected and warranted, this decision has been met with very strong feelings across the nation, and in our church community. I have heard from many of you, and will continue to listen.

I thought it would be helpful to share with all of you how the National Setting of the United Church of Christ, our denomination, responded to the SCOTUS decision. To request a paper print out of the response, entitled, 'We will stand with you in protest': National Officers Speak Out After SC Overturns Roe v. Wade, please contact the church office and we will get you one.

Please note that the UCC is not a hierarchical nor creedal denomination. This means, in part, that from church to church, and within each individual congregation, we hold space for a broad spectrum of beliefs and do not require agreement on issues to participate in the life of Haslett Community Church or the United Church of Christ.
